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

The author (1710-1765) was a professor of history and belles-lettres at the Academy of Lausanne.

This volume is the only recorded book on Olingo, a minor, utopian worldlang. It is described as "basically Neo-Latin and Anglo-Saxon with roots and words selected from all the major languages..." Inside are multiple arguments for the use of Olingo as a tool for the achievement of world peace, translations of text, and a basic glossary.



An unusual treatment of the four gospels in verse. Subscriber list notes takers for approximately 175 copies, so the edition was likely a small one. Not in Darlow & Moule.

This is the first appearance of Fisher's translation, which surpasses all English translations that came before it.

Small 8vo, pp. 31, [1]; original blue printed wrappers; vertical crease else near fine. A rather informative pamphlet as to the conservative politics of the West Country in the late 19th century. Includes an 8-page list of members. We have found no copy of any book concerning this right-wing Bristol society, though, interestingly, there was an earlier and much shorter version apparently known to Hyett and Bazeley, The Bibliographer's Manual of Gloucestershire Literature...relating to the County of Gloucester or to the City of Bristol, Vol. III (Gloucester, 1895), p. 213 where they cite Rules and Regulations of the Bristol Constitutional Club [ca. 1885],

with only 16 pages. Not found in OCLC, COPAC, nor NUC.

and the only one of philological interest, undertaken by Bernard Quaritch. The Life of Brockett, compiler of *North Country Words* (1825), occupies the first 33 pages, and is followed by the glossary. This is the first and only printing of each text.

Not in Graff or Howes. Sabin 8662: "This is a report to the Secretary of the Treasury, printed apparently at Washington [in 1868]. Pages 1 and 2, which in the official edition contain the Letter of the Secretary, are here omitted."





First published in far less detailed fashion in 1627, the first part deals with the calendars of the ancient Greeks, Egyptians, Macedonians, Persians, Hebrews, and others. The second part examines different historical eras, celebrated eclipses, a chronology of the reigns of the Caesars, and the birth of Christ. The Uranologian contains Greek astronomical and chronological texts with Latin translations. Included are the commentaries of Geminus, Achillis Tatios, and Hipparchus on Aratus; Eratosthenes' life of Aratus; Ptolemy on appearances, Theodore of Gaza on the months, and the Computuses of Maximus, Isaac of Argyros and St. Andrew of Crete. Also included is an elaborate examination of classical conceptions and calculations of time. The work is considered to have surpassed Scaliger's earlier landmark on the subject, De emendatione

temporum, of 1537. The work also contains his Epistolarum, his correspondence with many of the leading thinkers in Europe at the time." Ebert 16328: "The best edition. The third volume contains besides the *Uranologion* several other pieces of Petavius which were first added to this edition. Brunet IV, 528.



Illingworth (1844-93) was an English photographer who accompanied both Captain James L. Fisk's 1866 expedition to the Montana Territory and Lt. Colonel George Custer's 1874 U.S. military expedition into the Black Hills of the Dakota Territory. In 1850, his family relocated to St. Paul, Minnesota, where his father operated a jewelry business. Illingworth helped in the business until he was about 20 years old, when he moved to Chicago to study wet plate photography. Illingworth produced some 1,600 negatives of the West and Midwest during his career. Many of these photos still exist in collections due to Illingworth's son who found the negatives in a St. Paul attic, and later sold his father's collection to a man named [Edward A.] Bromley. Bromley, in turn, sold the Black Hills images for \$60 to the South Dakota State Historical Society in 1919.


