First edition, 8vo, 39, [1]; 8 plates (as issued) at the back; (the plate list calls for 10 but plates VI and IX were never published); superlative copy in original printed pink wrappers; recent quarter cloth folding box. The Appendix contains also notes on diving-bells, etc. The U. S. Torpedo Station, founded in 1869 on Goat Island in Narraganset Bay in Rhode Island was the first of its kind in the United States.



2. **Batchelder, George W.** *A narrative of the life, travels and religious experience, of George Batchelder, from his birth, in the year 1803, to the year 1843. Written by himself.* Philadelphia: Barrett and Jones, printers, 1843.

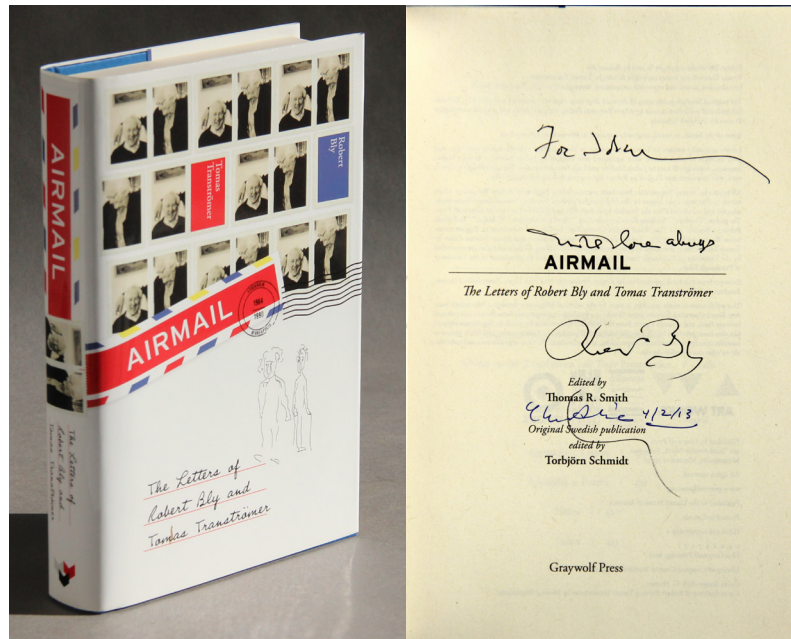

First edition limited to 200 copies, 16mo, pp. [8]; fine in original green printed wrappers. Inscribed in green ink by Bly "For Bill, the soul of Iceland, Robert." With a drawing by Bly incorporated into the inscription of a fish and a sea monster. The 'Bill' in the inscription is undoubtedly Bill Holm, the Minneota, Minnesota poet who lived part time in Iceland.

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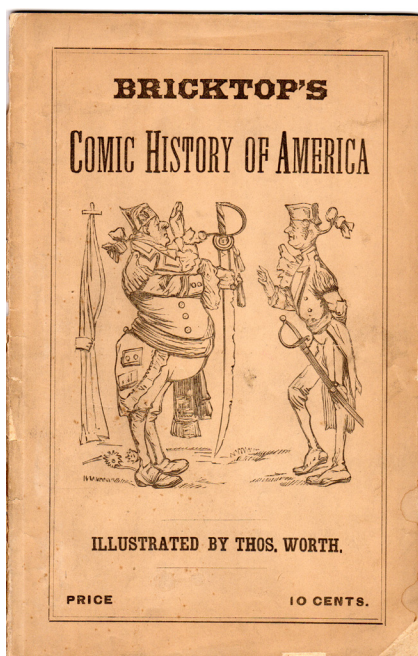

Approx. 9³/₄" x 7¹/₂", with a nice wood engraving of the staff of the bindery (both men and women) hard at work on the various facets of binding; fine.

The New York Book Bindery was established by Edward Walker in 1836. This advertisement was apparently printed between 1843, when Walker was first located at both 112 and 114 Fulton St., and 1848, when a similar advertisement appeared with

the earliest instance of the firm name as E. Walker & Sons.

"This old establishment is chiefly devoted to the finer and more costly styles of book-binding in Turkey morocco, Russia, English, French and American calf..." OCLC locates the Library Company, AAS, and Grolier copies only.



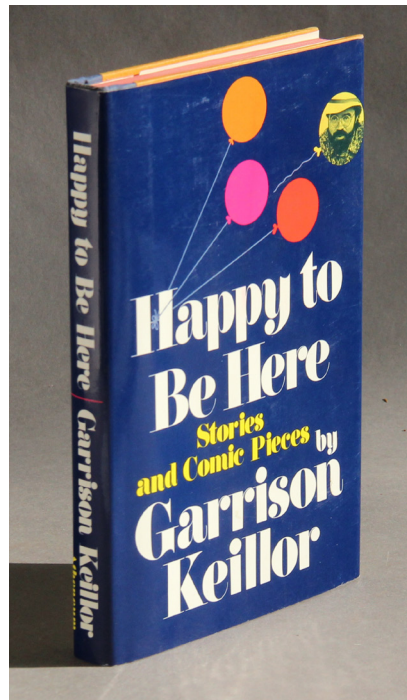
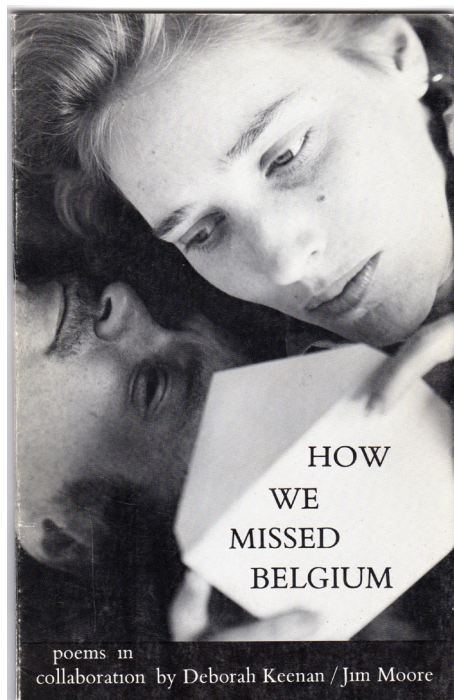

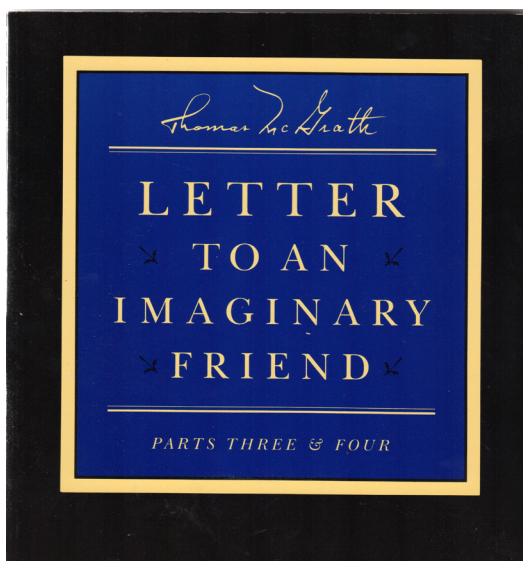

First edition thus, 8vo, pp. vi, [1], 8-63, [1]; wood-engraved frontispiece of the moon; very good copy in original printed wrappers.

An old bookseller's clipping laid in notes that this is "one of the immortal journalistic stunts of the 19th century. Locke, an editor of the *N. Y. Sun* in 1835, quintupled the circulation of his paper by running a fictitious report of Herschel's lunar discoveries at the Cape of Good Hope. It deceived

the entire country for weeks and established *The Sun* as a daily paper.

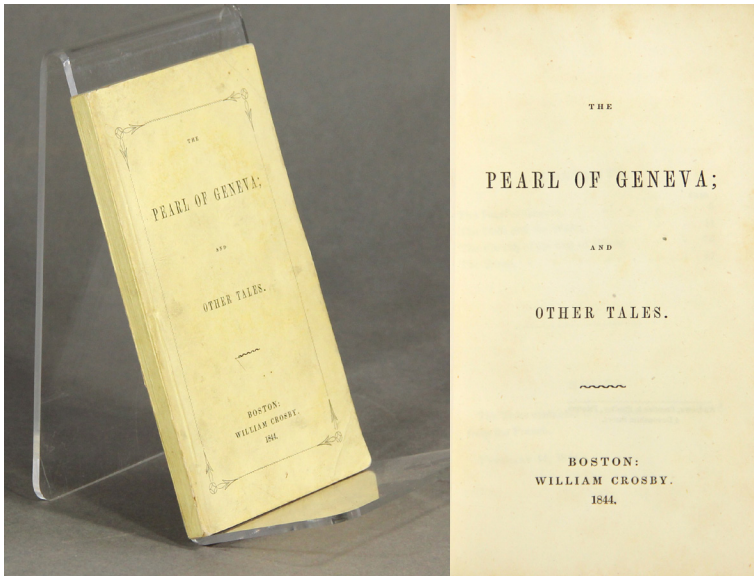
OCLC similarly notes: "A series of articles originally published in the *New York Sun*, August, 1835, under title, "Great astronomical discoveries," which purported to be an account of the discoveries of Sir John Herschel at the Cape of Good Hope, and which pretended to be reprinted from a supplement to the *Edinburgh Journal of Science* (then defunct). Has been ascribed on insufficient evidence to Joseph Nicolas Nicolle."

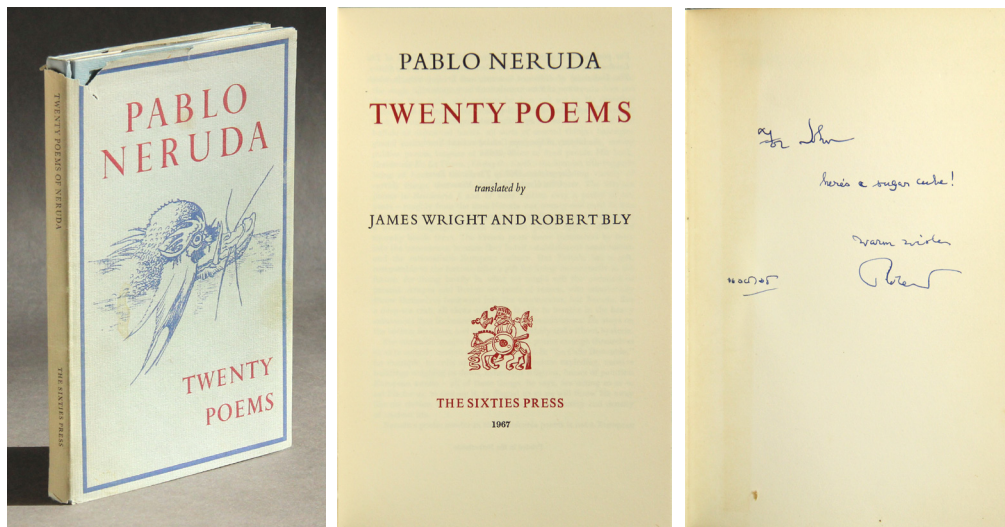

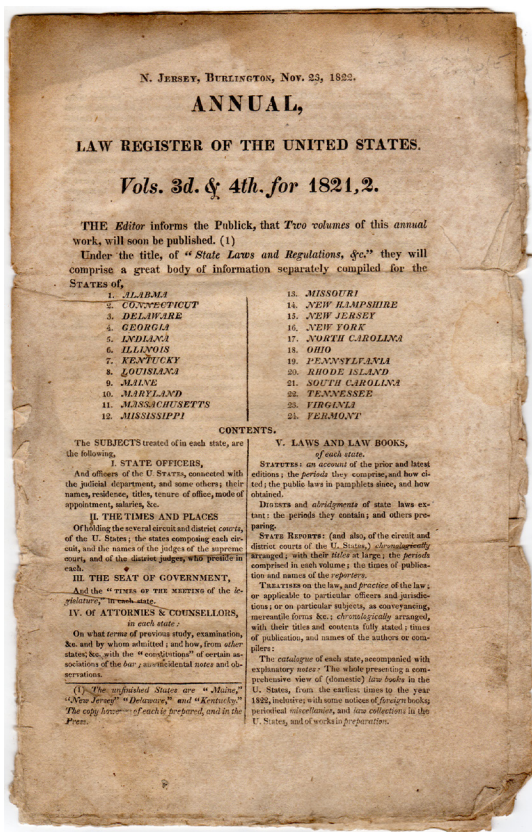
15. [Prisoners of War - Concentration Camps.] Large collection of covers, postcards, and letters from prisoners of the World Wars. \$12,500

A large collection of correspondence to and from prison camps during the two World Wars, representing a broad spectrum of locations, nationalities, and circumstances. 143 empty covers, 86 letters (most covers as well), and 174 postcards, along with a few dozen assorted package slips, labels, and other ephemera. All housed in three fine cloth clamshell boxes, backed in navy morocco gilt ruled, and with red morocco labels.

The majority of the material in this collection belongs to POWs of WWII, but there is a large subsection on WWI POWs and a number of items from interned political prisoners and Jews. All items in very good condition

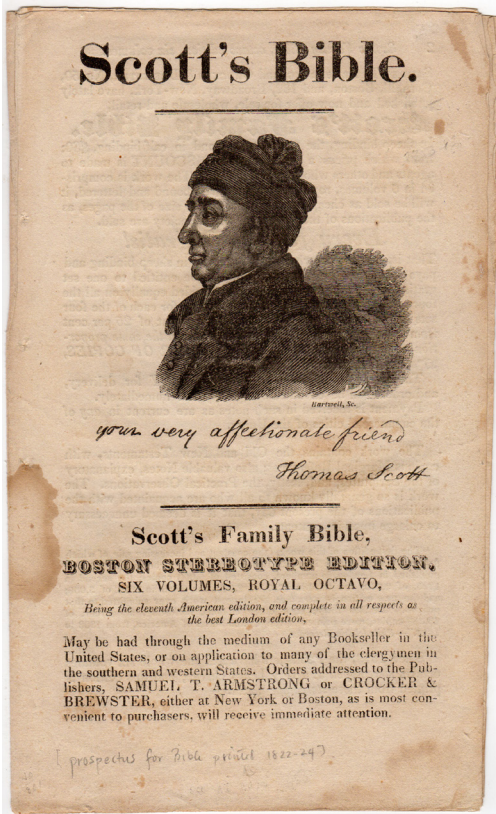
overall, with the very occasional tear or stain. Of special interest are letters from the camps of Gross-Rosen, Buchenwald, Dachau and Auschwitz, covers addressed to POWs in South East Asia, letters and postcards with parts excised by sensors, and the various cancels and other stamps from over 2 dozen camps throughout the two World Wars. A more complete inventory is available upon request.

Throughout both WWI and WWII mail continued to flow freely to and from prison camps. Parcels were heavily censored and delayed to prevent espionage, and the frequency and degree to which prisoners could send or receive any communication varied from camp to camp. In many cases these short letters were the last contact the prisoner might ever have with loved ones before succumbing to illness, neglect, violence, or death.

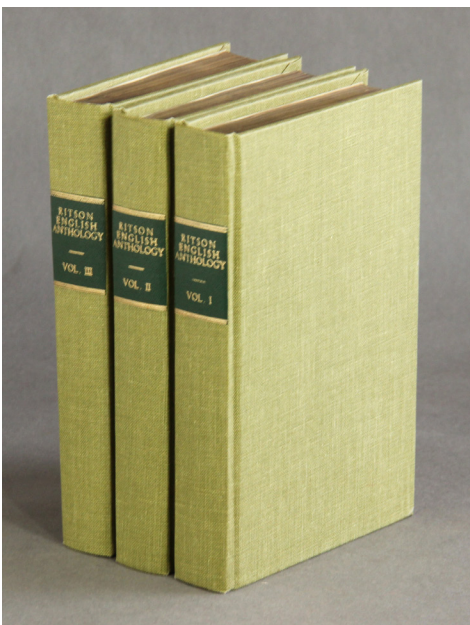

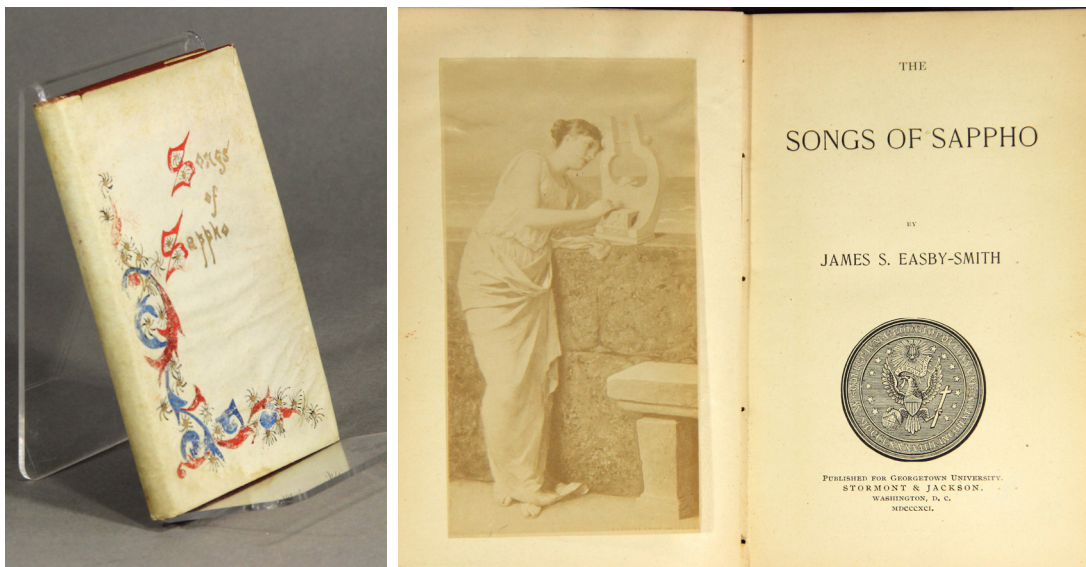
state by state (including Arkansas and Michigan territories, and Upper Canada) who are accepting orders. A similar prospectus dated 1824 is at AAS, and another (unlocated) dated 1826. A much different version also appeared in 1822. Not in *American Imprints* or OCLC.



18. **Ritson, Joseph.** *The English anthology.* London: printed by C. Clarke for T. and J. Edgerton, 1793-94. \$175

First edition, 3 volumes, 8vo; engraved vignette title pages; wanting the half-title in volume I, else a nice set in recent green cloth, green morocco labels lettered in gilt on spine, t.e.g. Ritson (1752-1803) spent his time studying English literature and history with the object of expunging errors made by others. His interest bordered on the fanatical. He not only assailed Johnson's and Steven's

editions of Shakespeare, but attacked Pinkerton's *Select Scottish Ballads* as fraudulent, and exposed Ireland's Shakespeare manuscripts as forgeries. Although Ritson acquired a reputation as an editor of literary anthologies, mostly of popular poetry and ballads, his uncompromising and supercilious temperament combined with unprovoked attacks on his contemporaries brought him many enemies. "Earlier in his life a "perusal of Mandeville's *Fable of the Bees* impelled Ritson to forswear all animal food, and to subsist solely on milk and vegetables. To this depressing diet he adhered, in the face of much ridicule, until death, and it was doubtless in part responsible for the moroseness of temper which characterized his later years" (see DNB).

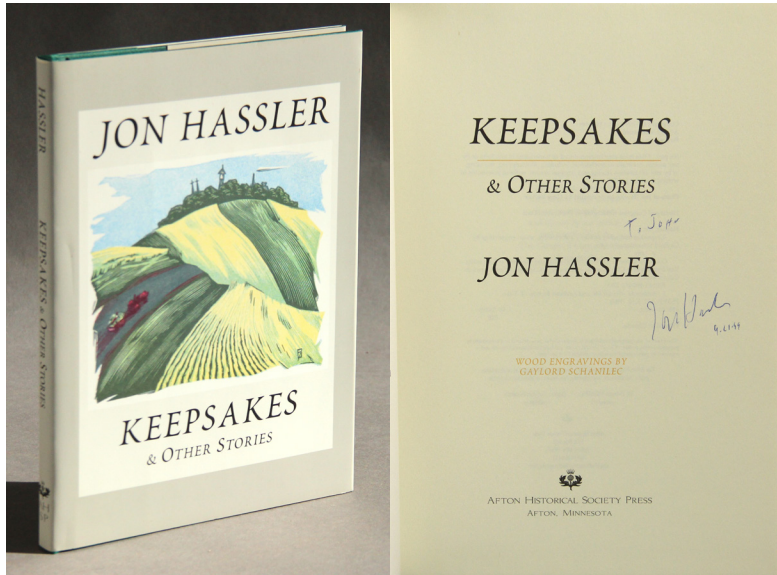

Lovering, Easter 1894," and with 3 photographs of women tipped in (one with a creased corner), together with a 5-page manuscript on the verso of front flyleaf, half-title and rear flyleaves, with quotes from other authors (Plato, Symons, Swinburne, et al.) on the poems of Sappho; also tipped in are 3 small pertinent newspaper clippings, each with resultant shadow. This copy with a hand-illuminated dust jacket on

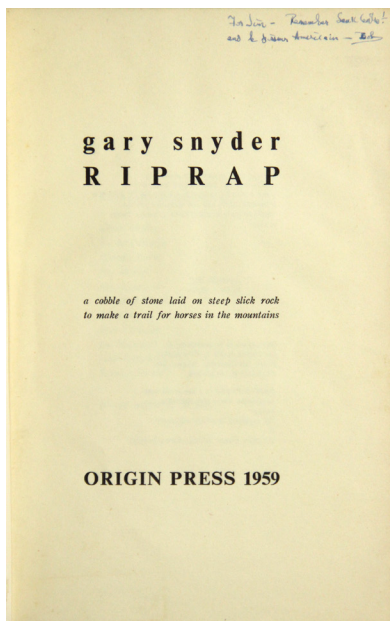
parchment, probably made by Lovering. The translations of Sappho were made by Easby-Smith during his senior year at Georgetown, and the book includes a 16-page “Memoir” of Sappho.



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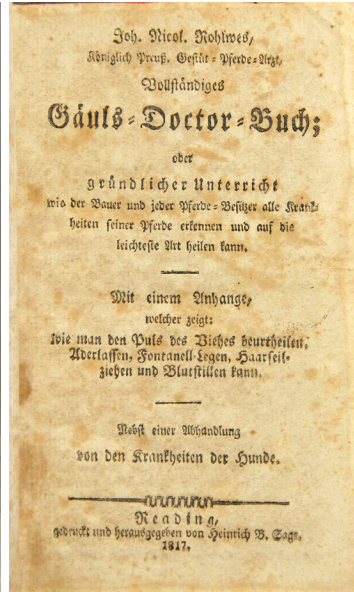

The color wood engraving, “Plainview” (also known as “Roger Rode to Town”) is erroneously identified on the dust jacket as “Roger Rudy Goes to Town.””

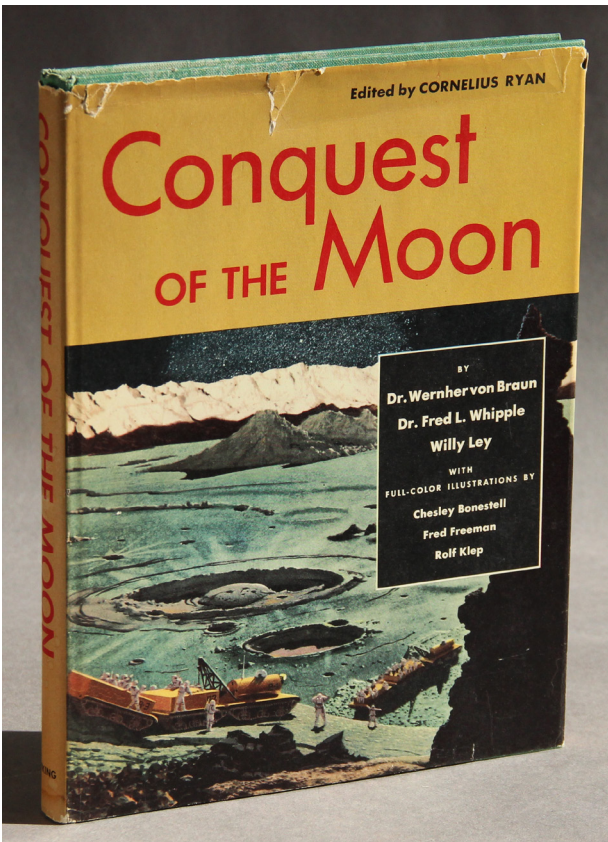

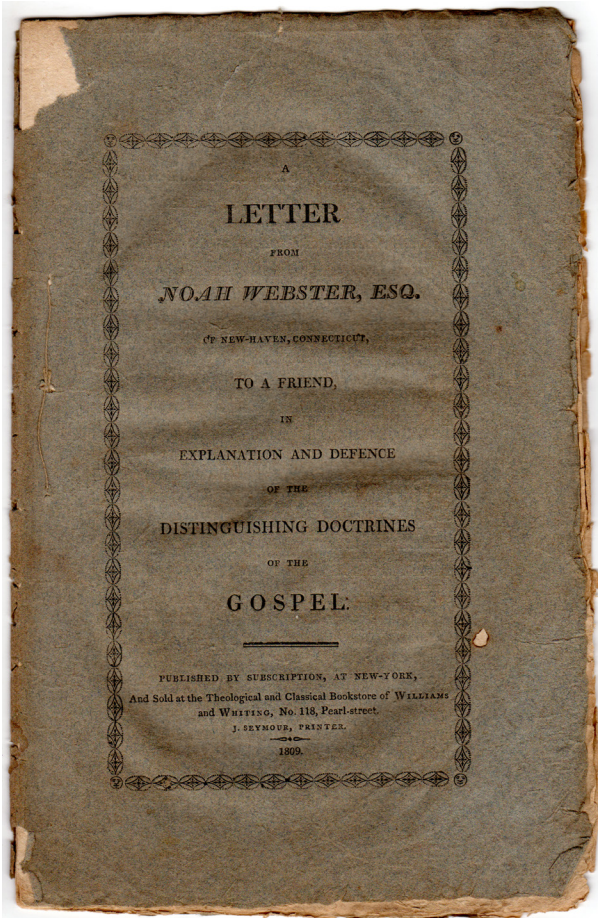

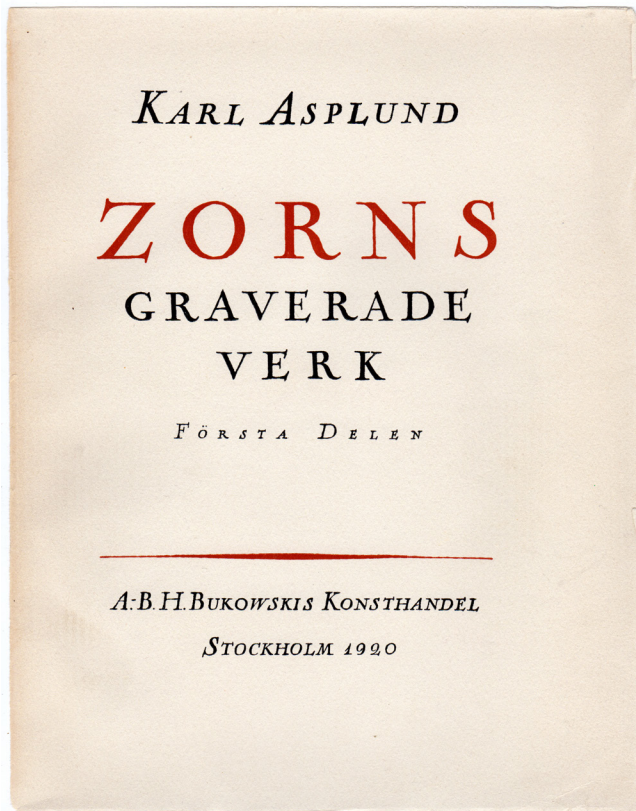

“In 1808 Webster and Judge Thomas Dawes of Boston, one of his wife’s brothers-in-law, discussed religion in their correspondence. Webster, on December 20, 1808, wrote a detailed letter summarizing his religious experiences and beliefs; Dawes acknowledged it on February 6, 1809, expressing rather liberal views, and on February 23 Webster wrote a long answer, which became the present text...The compiler believes this printing to have been the first separate edition” (Skeel).

It was also published in the *Panoplist* and the *Missionary Magazine United*, edited by Jedidiah Morse. The verso of the front wrapper and both sides of the back wrapper contain a brief summary of the firm Williams & Whiting, and publisher’s advertisements.

 First edition limited to 325 copies, this one of 300 of the regular edition ordinary paper, 2 volumes, large 4to, pp. xxiii, [1], 194; [2], 195-452, [10], plus one leaf "66a" and errata slip; publisher's slipcases with printed paper labels; front cover of volume I loose, but present; text toned (as usual) spines cracked and splitting (as usual); a notoriously bad job of book production but this copy for all its faults is generally clean and bright.
